## 1. UPSC Exam Structure Overview {#exam-structure}

The UPSC Civil Services Examination consists of three stages:

## Stage 1: Preliminary Examination (Objective Type)

- Paper I: General Studies (200 marks, 100 questions, 2 hours)
- Paper II: CSAT (200 marks, 80 questions, 2 hours) Qualifying Paper
- Negative Marking: 1/3rd marks deducted for wrong answers

## Stage 2: Main Examination (Descriptive Type)

- Total Papers: 9 papers (1750 marks)
- Qualifying Papers: 2 (Language papers 300 marks each)
- Merit Ranking Papers: 7 (1750 marks total)

## Stage 3: Personality Test (Interview)

- Marks: 275 marks
- Total Merit Calculation: Mains + Interview = 2025 marks
